



THE TOP 10 DINING CHAIRS

Designers Tamzin Greenhill and Chad Eisner pull up a seat and find these stylish essentials to be the perfect companions for any dinner party

Communal meals have always been a binding force for families and even nations, as this month's turkey dinner reminds us. But while the food lures people in, it's the dining chairs that hold the group together, from the first bite till long after the last.

That is, if the chairs are comfortable, says designer Chad Eisner. "I'd sacrifice aesthetics to comfort any day," he says. Proportions are key: What is roomy to one might be cramped to another. He also likes to mix side chairs (nimbler and narrower) with arm-

chairs (more relaxing). When judging a chair, Eisner advises looking at it from all angles: "More often you will see it from the back, not the front."

Decorator Tamzin Greenhill says to envision a chair in multiples: "There may be as many as six or eight, so you don't want them to be overwhelming." Otherwise, she has few rules. For a recent project she paired a traditional farmhouse table with Eames chairs—a testament to the end of the era of matching dining sets ("Thank God!" she says).

I / WAYLAND SIDE CHAIR BY O&G STUDIO

"I love this color—it's like your grandmother's chair was given a makeover," says Chad Eisner of this streamlined take on a traditional Windsor. "And the price is great." Tamzin Greenhill pictures the playful piece in a casual setting, such as a country house. Given the generous scale, she would use a pair of them at the ends of a table, mixed with other seating. Made of maple and ash, the chair can be ordered in a range of finishes. 25" w. x 23" d. x 42" h.; \$680; oandgstudio.com



2 / WOVEN SIDE CHAIR BY MARK ALBRECHT FROM SUITE NEW YORK

To Greenhill, the woven leather lends this chair a masculine feel. "The seat gives a little, so it's really comfortable," she says. Eisner likes the mix of black steel and brown leather, and admires how light shines through the straps. "I would pair this with a glass-top table, so you can see the weaving," he suggests. "This chair has a simple elegance," says Elsner, adding that it's reminiscent of Chinese furniture. The design is so open and airy, it could lighten up a room," he adds. Greenhill is a fan of the white-stained ash and curved arms. "I see this in both a modern, formal room and a family breakfast area," she says. 4 / SHAKER CHAIR BY STUDIO MATTERMADE FOR MATTER

The woven fabric tape on this chair may nod to Shaker style, but the ebonized-ash frame is refreshingly contemporary, says Greenhill: "The lines are so clean, from the angular legs to the double struts." Eisner points out that the webbing adds an appealing texture. He imagines the chair alongside a rustic table. 5 / JACQUES GUILLON CORD CHAIR BY AVENUE ROAD

"Extremely sexy—it's Fifty Shades of Grey meets Catwoman," Elsner says of this black-stained wood chair, which has a cord seat and back. Greenhill agrees: "it's chic, with an edge." She praises the craftsmanship, adding, "it's more comfortable than it looks."
